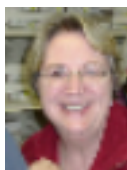

At Mayfair United Church
On Monday March 2, 2008

1. President Pat Ramage called the meeting to order at 7:32 p.m.
2. A total of 22 members and guests attended the meeting.
3. The minutes of the last meetings were not available.
4. First time attending meeting were Wenonah and Don Gall, and Albert Degerness.
5. Everybody introduced himself/herself by name, type of ostomy surgery and what they remember about having a visitor after surgery if they had a visitor.
6. Peter and Donna Folk celebrated 33rd wedding anniversary and Teri and her hubby celebrated 17th wedding anniversary.
7. Social Events & Luncheon coordinator was not able to attend, so the names of people bringing goodies for April meeting were taken. May is the 35th anniversary, so goodies are not needed that month.
8. Robert Crawford, visitation coordinator, arranged visitation for one colostomy, four Ileostomy and two Urostomy surgery patients. Howard Rankin stated that he was a visitor in the past and would like to be active again.

If a person signs an organ donation card, or includes a sticker on their health card, that does not guarantee that they will be harvested for organs. The patient's family still must sign the consent form. For the most part, donations of kidneys remain in the province that the patient resides. Donors and recipients are matched using the best tissue match (HLA).
18. The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m. by Peter Folk/Sandy Roberts.

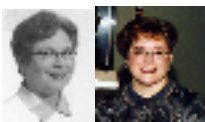

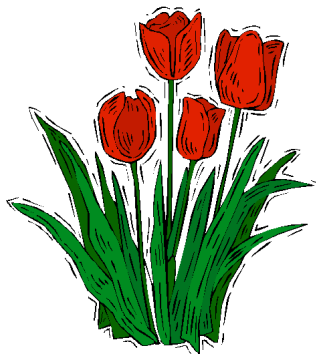

A Simple Life Story

This is the story of one of the recipient of the colostomy bags given by FOWC. He is the person I mentioned that lives in the province of Santiago City which is almost a 9 hour drive from Manila proper. I was not able to meet him personally but a friend of his was able to get in touch with me and I have sent him the needed supplies. The attached picture here was taken still in January 2007 because he no longer wants a picture taken at present because he has grown thin. Unfortunately, they are a family with a history of cancer. His mother extends their heartfelt gratitude to you for the colostomy bags.

Ronaldo Lora

Colon Cancer, Stage IV with peritoneal carcinomatosis
Ronnie is 45 who was diagnosed last July 27, 2007, to have cecal mass thru colonoscopy. For one year, he had stomach problems which he just ignored. His gastroenterologist

suggested an operation to remove the mass. When he was opened, it turned out to be peritoneal carcinomatosis so the only thing his surgeon did was to get a sample for biopsy and ileostomy. Biopsy revealed metastatic adenocarcinoma. He had undergone 12 sessions of chemotherapy every other week which ended last February, 2008. All masses and lesions and ascites were gone except for a small mass at the right lobe of the liver. He rested from chemo but after 2 months, his CEA went up again and it was found to be due to pulmonary metastasis. He tried one session of oral chemo but he couldn't tolerate it. Due to financial problems, he stopped the oral chemo. Now he has lost so much weight and can barely walk to the toilet. Before, he was just using an improvised bag, that he has to clean himself. He is on morphine now, 10 mg every 12 hours and he is just taking herbal medicine. He is still hoping to get better. He will celebrate his birthday on August 8, 2008.

Mark Anthony Reynon - Philippines

He is the youngest among 4 children age 3 years old. He was found out to have Hirschsprung's disease. His father is the sole breadwinner of the family while his mother stays at home and looks after the needs of their children. The family had used improvised plastic to collect the stool since the time Mark was operated for colostomy. The little boy is up and about not minding the surgery and plays around although he is aware of the stool that comes out his abdomen. This is the first time he will be using colostomy bags saving time for his mother on hygiene and cleanliness.

Colima, Mexico

During my visit to Colima, Mexico in February, I was present when the first satellite chapter was started. The President of this satellite chapter has an urostomy, but when supplies are unavailable she has to use colostomy bags. FOWC created an urostomy supply parcel and shipped it to her. She received our parcel and has sent me a picture displaying the content and included a very nice letter. The letter reads:
Dear Astrid. I remember you very well and send greetings to you and I'm telling you that I received the supplies. These supplies are very necessary for me and the group. I

appreciate your kindness and support. All people from Ostocol and Ostohan (Manzanillo) remember you by the great work you do for the ostomate people, not only for Mexico, but all around the world. I'm very glad and happy to have the opportunity to know you and know also that there are people as you that send help and love to the poor people. You send donations to many people who have a strong need to enjoy life, because we are not alone now. Particular the supplies that you send us are very necessary. For me one piece or two piece supplies are good. Some of these items I can't use and I will provide these to other needy ostomates. I have an urostomy since I was 9 years old and now thanks to my God and you I'm living. I am 26 years old with only one kidney. The urostomy supplies that you have send me I never used before so it was a little challenge for me to use it the first time. In the night I'm used to wear diapers. Thanks for your support. There are few people with urostomy here and it is very difficult to get this

kind of urostomy appliances. God bless you and protect you and Doug for the great work you are doing. Greetings to you both. We love you. Take care. I send hugs and kisses for you and look forward seeing you in February 2009.

*** To provide an opportunity for young people aged 9-18 with consideration to emotional growth and maturity, who have ostomies or other special related needs (intermittent catheterization; urinary or bowel incontinence; internal pouch; Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis), to attend camp and participate in camp activities under professional supervision**

Pointers for the New Ostomate

- There is no answer for "Why me?" but it is normal to ask the question and you do need to work through the answer.
- Each person's ostomy is different, even as our finger prints are different.
- Support and information received from someone who has an ostomy can be helpful. Ask your doctor or ET nurse to arrange an ostomy visitor.
- It is your ostomy; learn to manage it and don't let it manage you. In the beginning, it is normal for your ostomy care to be the center of your existence; however, with time and practice your ostomy and its care will become just a normal part of your life.
- Basic management skills can be learned.
- Any problems that develop must be met and managed as they occur. With time and experience you will become comfortable with your ostomy care.
- You are alive! You will get better and stronger. Give yourself time to get over surgery and to adjust to this body change and adapt to your ostomy.

Stomal Complications

Complications related to the stoma may range from a minor inconvenience to a surgical emergency. Many problems can be prevented if the stoma is correctly constructed and properly placed, which involves a combination of the skills of the surgeon and ET nurse. First will be a description of the normal stoma followed by possible stomal complications. Keep in mind that all changes in your stoma should be reported to your physician or ET nurse.

Normal: Red or pink, moist appearance. Slight bleeding is normal with cleansing. Swelling should decrease over a period of 6-8 weeks after surgery. Movement of the stoma is normal, and it may move in and out with changes in your position. Stomas are fairly hardy, but should be protected from physical blows, tight clothing, and rigid objects. The stoma has no feeling; therefore, it can be injured without pain. Always check your stoma with each pouch change, and report any change to your physician or ET nurse.

Change in Color (Ischemia/Necrosis): Caused by an inadequate blood supply to the stoma. Sometimes a stoma will "pink up" as swelling decreases. If the stoma continues to darken--turns dusky blue, dark brown or black, you should report this to your physician immediately. If the stoma does not improve, surgical revision may be needed.

Disappearing Stoma (Retraction): This is when the stoma pulls back into the abdomen which can be caused by scarring, adhesion or weight gain. Treatment may be the use of an appliance with convexity, topical products or surgical revision.

Protruding Stoma (Prolapse): This is caused by weak abdominal muscles, and the bowel appears to hang out of the abdomen. Sometimes pushing the stoma back in (by someone trained) followed by use of a binder will help. Surgical revision may be needed as the stoma may lose blood supply or stop functioning.

Bulging Around Stoma (Herniation): This is caused by protrusion of the bowel around the stoma. It is most noticed when sitting or standing. It is associated with weak muscles or obesity. Treatment may be weight control, increase of exercise slowly, exercises to strengthen abdominal muscles, supportive binder or surgical revision.

Narrowing of the Stoma (Stenosis/Stricture): This can be caused by repeated dilatation's (opening the stoma with a finger), alkaline urine causing a warty growth, repeated skin breakdown resulting in scarring or a disease process. Surgical revision may be needed if narrowing is severe. If recommended, dilatation's should be done correctly and gently. An ET nurse should be consulted for recommendation regarding alkaline urine, a properly fitting appliance, or products that prevent skin damage.
