2006 UOAC Conference

The United Ostomy Association of Canada held their 9th Annual Conference in Moncton, New Brunswick from August 16th to 20th, 2006.

- Wednesday Trip to Moncton

Donna and I had spent a week before the conference in St. John's Newfoundland. We took a CanJet flight from St. John's to Moncton. Met up with James at the airport. We checked into the Delta Beasejour hotel. Then we went for a tour of Moncton, the magnetic hill and had a Chinese food buffet supper at a local restaurant.

- Wednesday night meet and greet

Very enjoyable and relaxed atmosphere. Met with several people I had met at other conferences. The food was served at 9:00 p.m. They had lots of door prizes. They had some fiddlers for entertainment. They were pretty good! I won one of the door prizes.

- Thursday grand opening ceremonies

Yet through all the hospital stays and problems, she graduated with High Honors and has won a scholarship for four years to attend St. Thomas University in Fredricton to earn a Bachelor of Arts in Education degree. She is very active in singing and sang the O Canada at the grand opening. Donna and I sat with Erin and Ferne at Friday's banquet and I've posted photos of them on our website

- Thursday Grand Opening of Exhibit Hall

Many displays from the major appliance suppliers - it was a chance to meet and talk to them about new products and about any problems. I got to talk to the conference committee from Calgary and they have an exciting conference planned for 2007!

- Thursday trip to "The Rock"

Dr. Peter Lightfoot has performed over 200 capsule endoscopies since 2003 in Moncton, one of only a few hospitals in Canada that perform the procedure.

The capsules cost \$1000 each and can only be used once because of the batteries. The patient wears a recorder and sensors for the 8 hours that the capsule passes through the esophagus, stomach and small intestine.

- Friday Erectile Dysfunction session

Dr. Guy LeBlanc gave a humorous and informative presentation about the subject. Many of the women were in attendance as well.

- Friday Convatec banquet and Renaissance Award

Rob Hill, an ileostomate who is a rock climber was the special guest speaker. He has climbed six out of seven of each continent's highest peaks. He is on track to climb Mt. Everest in 2008. Excellent supper. The Renaissance awards were presented, one for each region and then the grand prize winner, Minerva Holton

- Saturday morning National Council meeting

Sharing Life Story

I am a survivor of colon/rectal cancer.

In June of 1996, I had a physical exam. During the digital rectal exam, a lump was found. A colonoscopy confirmed that it was cancer. I was in St. Paul's Hospital for surgery (abdominal perineal resection and colostomy) on July 5th and was off work until August 19. I had six months of Chemo (5FU/Leukovorin) starting August 12. During the six months, I also had six weeks of radiation therapy starting October 15. My final day of radiation was November 25 - wahoo! My final day of chemotherapy was February 28, 1997.

During my hospital stay, I had a visitor (Arnold Friestadt) from the Saskatoon Osotmy Association and it was a great relief to me. I was able to see someone who survived the same thing that I did and was healthy and active. This encouraged me. Before, during and after my surgery, I had Terri Schroeder as my ET.

Life story continued...

I found her to be very knowledgeable and she helped me during the more difficult

times. Thanks Terri.

For the first few years I had medical checkups every three months, then every 6 months, then every year. So far, everything has been clear, and I only have to have colonoscopies every three years now.
