Ostomy Myths and Facts

MYTH: An ostomy stoma often causes pain.

FACT: Because stomas have no nerve endings, they can't transmit pain or other sensations. They're rich in blood vessels, however, and may bleed easily if irritated.

MYTH: A red, shiny stoma signals an infection.

FACT: Actually, that's a stoma's normal appearance. A pale color may indicate anemia or poor circulation. A dark color may be a sign of internal stricture or loss of circulation.

MEETING MINUTES

SASKATOON OSTOMY ASSOCIATION

At Mayfair United Church

On Monday Oct 6, 2008

1. President Pat Ramage called the meeting to order at 7:32 p.m. with 24 people in attendance.
2. Pat invited everyone to stand, state their name, and one thing that they are thankful for.
3. There were no minutes of previous meeting to read.
4. Treasurer Evan Wight reported a bank balance of approximately #####.
5. Three people were attending their first meeting.
6. Membership director Marlyne Wight reported that not much was happening with membership over the summer and she is still trying to learn how to do the computer list. Membership renewals will be sent out by the UOAC office soon and she wants everyone to mail the cheques to her home rather than Nordon's. She will be in Cuba in January for her son's wedding and asks everyone to send their cheques before she leaves so she can mail out the membership cards.
7. Social chairman Evelyn Peters requested that people give her their phone numbers when volunteering to bring snacks for the meetings. She likes to phone everyone that is bringing snacks before the meetings to remind them.
8. Visitation Chairman Robert Crawford reported that there were 3 colostomy, 4 Ileostomy and 2 Urostomy visits during the month of September.
9. Pat and Robert discussed having a visitation training session in the new year.
10. Mail - Bob McLean wrote a letter to his MLA asking for full coverage of Ostomy supplies from SAIL. Pat Ramage agreed to write a letter as well on behalf of the Saskatoon Ostomy Association and encouraged individuals to also write letters to their MLA and to the Health Minister. The government has a surplus in their budget this year and are asking people for ideas on how to spend the money.
11. There was a discussion about the Disability Tax Credit from Revenue Canada. Three people at the meeting have applied for it and are getting the credit. Revenue Canada has forms to fill out and you have to get your family doctor to sign them. You can also download the forms on the Revenue Canada website.
12. Evelyn Peters welcomed everyone to the new meeting location at Mayfair United Church and let everyone know where the kitchen and washrooms were.
13. Mail - Hollister sent personal invitations to attend their 50th anniversary celebration in Edmonton on

- Wednesday, October 29. You can RSVP by mail, phone or email.
14. Mail - Project Share thanked Saskatoon Ostomy Association and Nordon Medical for three boxes of Ostomy supplies sent to FOW Canada. Thank you from Astrid Graham, president of FOW Canada.
 15. Mail - a Thank you note from thanking us for three boxes of Ostomy supplies sent to FOW Canada.
 16. Mail - a thank you note from UOAC Ostomy Youth camp thanking Saskatoon Ostomy Association for the generous donation for Ostomy Youth camp this year. The letter was signed by Doug Graham, past president of the UOAC.
 17. Pat Ramage handed out some volunteer pins.
 18. Newsletter - Marlyne has extra copies of the newsletters. Some were taken by the three new members, some were taken by the ETs to hand out, and some were sent to Nordon Medical to give away.
 19. There was discussion as to whether we should continue to use Nordon Medical as the mailing address for the Saskatoon Ostomy Association. Kathy Guina will ask the Saskatoon Health Region if we can use the Stoma Clinic mailing address. She will report back at the next meeting.
 20. Marlyne received a catalogue with helpful information for older adults. She gave away extra copies to members that requested them and gave one to Kathy Guina to put in the library. There was discussion as to why the Saskatoon Ostomy Association was not listed in the catalogue, and Marlyne was going to contact the editor. Later it was found that the Saskatoon Ostomy Association WAS listed, but filed under Cancer.
 21. Pat Ramage reminded members about the "Live well with Chronic Conditions" pamphlet and the availability of courses on this subject to groups or individuals.
 22. Evan Wight gave a talk on Ostomy youth camp. Evan was a volunteer this year instead of a camper and had a different experience now that he is older. He was responsible for three younger male campers and talked about the fun they had rock climbing, giant swinging, rafting, and of course, Magic Circle. He mentioned that Barbara Nelson, a social worker from Toronto, attended camp this year for the first time. She probably referred half the campers that attended this year and was really impressed by the camp.
 23. Question about TV, DVD, VCR - does the SOA own these? It was thought that we do, but don't have anywhere to store them, so they are still at Nordon's. Evelyn will ask Mayfair United Church if it is possible to borrow their TV and VCR for future meetings if required.
 24. Terri Schroeder also shared some stories from Ostomy Youth Camp as she volunteered as an ET at the camp for the first time and traveled with Evan to camp. She also helped pick up the campers from the airport and drive them to camp.
 25. Robert Crawford passed around a sign-up sheet for any member that does not have visitor training if they would like to attend the training session that is planned. Three names were collected.
 26. ET report - Sandy Roberts now works at St. Paul's Hospital and Kathy covers RUH and City hospital. All outpatient visits now are ONLY held at RUH as St. Paul's could not develop a procedure whereby patients and ETs could meet.
 27. Mark McAvoy gave a short testimony on how he enjoyed the conference in Hamilton and was impressed by how much he had learned about his Ostomy from the ETs compared to other people in his support group meeting at the conference.
 28. Peter Folk gave a report from UOAC national board. He is now the chair of the UOAC connection and of the website. He is also a member of the finance committee. His next board meeting is October 23 - 26. If any member from Saskatoon has concerns about what is happening nationally, get Peter's ear and he will bring the concern to the board meeting. Peter did not have any details about upcoming cluster/regional meetings scheduled for 2009. The next conference is in 2010 in Sydney, NS.
 29. Motion by Robert Crawford seconded by Ed Palchinski to adjourn at 8:43 p.m.
 30. The 50/50 draw was held and the winner was Bill Zbitniff and his share was \$32.50

Remembrance Day Lest we forget

On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, Canadians are asked to pause and remember the thousands of men and women who sacrificed their lives fighting for freedom and democracy during the First World War, the Second World War, the Korean War, the Afghanistan conflict and during peacekeeping missions.

The first Remembrance Day, held in 1919 throughout the Commonwealth, was originally called Armistice Day. The day commemorated the end of the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m.: the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow

Between the crosses, row on row

That mark our place; and in the sky

The larks, still bravely singing, fly

Scarce heard amid the guns below.



Disability Tax Credit Form

Income tax time is coming up soon for many of us. If you have a colostomy, ileostomy or urostomy you may be eligible for a tax credit. The form required is not widely advertised and does not come with your standard income tax form, you must request form #T2201 and it will be sent to you. The DTC was instituted some years ago for individuals who have an impairment in physical or mental function' that is deemed 'severe and prolonged. Individuals with an ostomy are deemed to have a significant impairment in the bodily function of elimination (bowel or bladder) and are therefore eligible the same as, for example, someone with a severe visual impairment. The form is not difficult to complete and once done, you need to take it to your doctor for verification of your condition. You are only eligible for the disability amount if a qualified practitioner (your doctor) certifies, on the form, that you have a prolonged impairment and certifies its effects, and if the income tax people approve your form. Your doctor may write his or her own letter detailing the extent of your situation, or you may write your own assessment and present it to your doctor for his or her certification. Some doctors will charge for this service. You can send Form #T2201 at any time of the year, but it's recommended that you submit it before you file your income tax return. If you send it in later, or at the same time, it will still be processed but this may take longer for your submission to be assessed. If you are deemed ineligible, the form will not affect the outcome of your usual tax return. If you have had your ostomy for some time, a successful DTC assessment will be prorated back to either the date on which you had your surgery, or the date when form T2201 was first instituted (if your surgery was performed many years ago). How much you get back will vary depending on your income, and when your ostomy surgery was first performed. To obtain a copy of the Disability Tax Credit Form you can call 1-800-959-2221 and request Form #T2201. Or you can order online at www.cra.gc.ca/forms. You can request more than one copy of this form, which will be mailed to you.
